ENGAGEMENT FIRST... DUES STRUCTURE CHANGES (PERHAPS) LATER

After hours of discussion and extensive research, the Financial Task Force has decided to focus primarily on increasing engagement and postpone a vote on changing our dues structure. Work done by the task force to date, including focus group discussions with temple members, has highlighted the value of strengthening community ties and supporting the needs of the congregation.

Along with changing its name to the Engagement Committee, the Task Force hopes to recruit some exceptional leaders from within the congregation to help support its efforts in this direction. The committee plans to host more focus groups and other types of meetings to hear the congregation's views on both engagement and possibly changing our dues model at some later date.

From Rabbi Ken Turkey to God

What should a Jew eat on Thanksgiving? Hebrew offers us a clue. On our holy days, we often sing Psalms, many of which include the

phrase "Hodu la-Adonai." The word "Hodu" means "Thank," so the Psalms call on us to give thanks to God. Coincidentally, the word "hodu" can also mean "turkey;" although it does not fit the meaning of the Psalm, it certainly fits our Thanksgiving menu!

Ironically, on the day we give thanks for what we have, many of us consume far more than we need. And not only on Thanksgiving. The day after Thanksgiving is the busiest shopping day of the year. Why is that? It's not just because so many people have the day off from work. Rather, after we are done being grateful, our focus turns to those things we or our loved ones lack. We are blessed with so much. Many of us have loving families, or at least good friends. Most of us are in reasonably good health. Almost all of us have food on our table and a roof over our heads. But too often we emphasize those things we do not have: the latest fashionable clothing, or a new phone, or a house on the Cape. This constant awareness of our unfulfilled desires keeps us from feeling grateful for the gifts we enjoy.

In *Pirkei Avot*, a section of the Talmud that emphasizes ethical conduct, we are taught "Who is rich? The one who is content with his or her lot." No matter how much or how little we may have, if we are satisfied with it, we have more than enough. The Hebrew word that means "rich" is a homonym for the word that means "happy." Playing on this dual sense, Rabbi Samson Raphael Hirsch, a great twentieth-century modern Orthodox scholar, teaches that "a man's craving for more and more wealth may well grow to such excess that the lack of what he does not now possess may actually mar his joy in what he does have at present. Yet it is precisely this joy in what one possesses, this contentment with one's portion, that constitutes the only genuine treasure and the sole true happiness in life; without it, even the richest of men will remain poor in the midst of all his wealth."

This is a lesson that the Pilgrims knew. They uprooted themselves from their homes. They risked a perilous journey across the ocean. They came to an unfamiliar land, where they had to start building, planting, surviving from scratch. They faced illness, harsh weather, and the native inhabitants of this country. If anyone had reasons to kvetch about their lot in life, they did. And yet somehow, they found it in themselves to focus on their blessings, to thank God for the gifts that God had given them. They had so little, and they were grateful for it. We need to get ourselves back there, to their mindset, which echoes how Jacob felt in the Torah portion we will read during Thanksgiving week this year. Fleeing his brother Esau's wrath, alone and frightened, Jacob stops for the night and has a dream of a ladder reaching to heaven. During Jacob's dream, God promises him land, descendants, protection, and God's eternal presence. Jacob awakens from his dream, and apprehends what has happened. He recognizes that he is in a holy place; he realizes that he needs to give thanks for what he has been given. In those first moments after awakening, he could see and feel God's presence and generosity clearly, and then he could be grateful for it. When we are able to see what he saw, and feel what he felt, then we will be able to say what he said: "Surely God is in this place."
