### From Rabbi Ken....

Voting for Israel

When Americans think about a vote coming in 2020, we probably have in mind the presidential election this November, and that one will

certainly be of major importance. But before then, for Jews, there actually is a different election that matters greatly in 2020, one in which voting begins this month. Every five years, the World Zionist Organization holds elections to the Zionist Congress, which determines policy for the WZO and the Jewish Agency for Israel, controlling hundreds of millions of dollars in support of Israel. The WZO is the primary institution for Diaspora Jewry around the world; consequently, voting is open to any Jew over the age of 18. Whoever has the largest number of representatives in the Congress will set goals and have access to the centers of power and money. So the direction of Israeli society for these next five years will be strongly influenced by this election.

As with any election, how we vote should be determined by our perception of what policies should be changed and what should continue. That begins with a recognition of the issues. As wonderful and vibrant a place as Israel is, she also, like all of us, has areas where she needs to improve. Israel faces a number of internal, domestic challenges. Religious pluralism remains an issue, as the liberal movements of Judaism continue to be face discrimination in the areas of governmental financial support, land grants to build facilities for synagogues and schools, and approval to officiate at life cycle events. Weddings, funerals, conversions, immigration—all require the approval of Orthodox rabbis, despite the fact that most Israelis are not and have never been Orthodox. Women continue to face obstacles in Israel, as the ultra-Orthodox seek to impose their restrictions for women on all of Israeli society: limiting women's religious expression at the Western Wall, sending women to the back of buses, trying to keep women off the radio airwaves. Anti-Arab racism is increasing within Israel, as demonstrated by the presence of anti-Arab parties in Israel's national elections (fortunately, they did not get enough votes to win places in the government).

The Reform movement in Israel is uniquely positioned to help Israeli society address these issues. Reform seeks a democratic Israel which respects and supports all expressions of Judaism, which respects and guarantees women's rights, which prosecutes violators of anti-racism laws, and which strives to obtain a peaceful solution to the Palestinian issue. A successful election is our best means to assure the realization of the Reform movement's goals for Israeli society. The election determines the Reform movement's influence within Israeli institutions and government bodies and provides the Reform movement with the ability to impact important policy appointments. In addition, the election affects the amount of funding that the Reform movement receives in Israel and the diaspora.

The Reform Movement's slate in these elections is represented by ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America. In the most recent elections, the American delegation (145 delegates) was the largest single group outside of Israel, and of those, ARZA has been the largest American delegation to the Congress, with 56 places. This representation has enabled ARZA to speak loudly and effectively on behalf of the Reform Movement, and to start to bring much-needed changes to these institutions. They have increased visibility and secured \$20 million for our Israeli community. But it is just a drop in the bucket of what is needed, especially when compared with the more than \$1 billion the Israeli government allocates to Orthodox institutions each year. A strong showing in this year's elections can continue and expand upon the progress that has been made so far. To accomplish this goal, we must vote for ARZA's slate in the elections. Anyone who is Jewish and over the age of 18 can vote; everyone who is Jewish and over the age of 18 should vote. Voting begins on January 21; please go to arza.org and register for a reminder and instructions for how to vote. (There is a minimal processing fee for voting; if that cost poses an obstacle, please let me know and I will handle it for you.) For the sake not only of our Reform institutions, but also for Reform values, and for a meaningful Judaism in Israel, I hope you will join me in voting for ARZA in these essential elections.

After spending many summers at Camp JORI, Leila is also looking forward to her upcoming summer experience in Israel with Camp JORI/BBYO. In her application, she wrote: "...I want to be able to experience Israel not only with my camp friends (my "summer family") but also be immersed in the Jewish culture and traditions of my heritage...and experience being in a country immersed in our history. These connections to my roots are very meaningful for me and help me understand and form my own Jewish identity."

The Rabbi Levenson/Sol Krumins Youth Scholarship Funds are to be used for members of Temple Chayai Shalom through college age to fund any Jewish educational program including, but not limited to: trips to Israel; NFTY summer programs, national conventions, Institutes; Hillel/Kesher conventions; and URJ national biennials. The fund is intended to be used for organized, peer experiences, such as those sponsored by camps, colleges, and youth organizations and is not intended to be competitive nor dependent on financial need.

Donations to the fund are always welcome. Applications for grants are available on the temple website.

## Planning your IRA withdrawals for 2020?

Consider donating to TCS through a Qualified Charitable Distribution! Donations from generous members of our congregation are vital to keeping



our doors open to all at TCS. Thanks to 2017 tax law changes, donating to the temple through a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) could save you money – while helping support our temple community. What is a QCD?

It's a tax-free withdrawal from an individual retirement account (IRA) that is sent directly to a charity. [401(k) accounts are not eligible.]

Who can make a QCD?

Anyone who owns one or more IRAs and is  $70\frac{1}{2}$  or older, and therefore must make required minimum distributions (RMDs) from their IRAs.

How does a QCD help?

By donating to TCS directly in the form of an IRA withdrawal (RMD), you can exclude the amount of the gift from your taxable income – even if you're taking the standard deduction.

What do I have to do?


Instead of taking your RMD personally and having to pay tax on it, you can instruct the IRA custodian to make a direct distribution of any amount (up to \$100,000 annually) directly payable to Temple Chayai Shalom (a qualified charity).


