

Connecting with the TCS Community in this Most Unusual Summer

We're at what feels like summer's mid point.

And what a strange summer it is, as many of us are trying to balance safety and sanity, being sensible and having a social life, protecting ourselves and having a bit of fun.

The end of July brought with it Tisha B'Av, the traditionally tragic day of the Jewish calendar, commemorating the destruction of the First and Second Temples in ancient Israel, marking a time a spiritual, religious, political and social crisis. This year we've had so much loss to reflect on – the loss of life, the loss of jobs and economic security, the loss of physical social connection.

Now at the beginning August we're in the time of Nachamu, which means comfort, when traditionally we recover from the focus on loss of Tisha B'Av by emphasizing God's love for us and acceptance of us, and we rebuild and heal after our losses.

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Hello members of the TCS community!

I hope this finds you healthy and safe. The Board and I have been working on a

number of initiatives as we face the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

As you are aware, David Reichman and I were able to secure a PPP loan of \$56,400 from our bank through the CARES Act. The loan allowed us to maintain our professional staff through the end of the last fiscal year and we anticipate that the loan will be forgiven during the current fiscal year.

We were also able to secure a \$5,000 grant from CJP which enabled us to improve the Temple security system by adding cameras on the exterior of the building, and adding additions to our alarm system at the Sanctuary emergency door and the area surrounding the Ark. My thanks to Mike Kamens for his work on this crucial project.

Hope everyone is doing well in times of COVID. David and I and our families are coping and healthy. As of August 1st I will no longer be the Chairperson of Senior Chai. Stanley S. and I have been reaching out to some members and their answers for being the Chair has been NO.

Thank you for the privilege of serving and being there for the TCS.



First, we can all be together! Since we will all fit in the online "room," we do not need split services. Second, we can record our services and put the recordings online, so that anyone who is unable for whatever reason to attend at the designated time will still be able to experience them later. Third, to avoid "screen fatigue," these services will be shorter than usual, more focused on the elements of the service unique and special to the High Holy Days.

We are making an exciting change to our service offerings. In many communities, especially of Sephardi origin, it is customary to have a Rosh ha-Shanah seder, a meal with special foods that symbolically express wishes and blessings for the year ahead. So we will be creating and leading a Rosh ha-Shanah seder instead of our "usual" Erev Rosh ha-Shanah service. This evening will be a fun, engaging, delicious way to welcome in the new year.

We are also revamping our children's programming. Those plans are still in process, but we are leaning toward doing them at a different time than the "main" services, so that families can experience either or both offerings together. We expect to create opportunities for the kids to engage more actively in shaping their service experience themselves. More information to come...

In addition to our "traditional" services, we eagerly anticipate sharing an entirely new way to deepen the meaning of the High Holy Days. We often focus on Rosh ha-Shanah and Yom Kippur, but Jewish tradition speaks of the time they bracket as the "Ten Days of Repentance" and the "Days of Awe." Also, the Talmud famously teaches (some people may know how to sing this text): "Al sh'loshah d'varim ha-olam omeid (On three things the world depends)--al ha-Torah, v'al ha-avodah, v'al g'milut chasadim (on Torah, on prayer, and on acts of lovingkindness)." Combining these two ideas, we will be offering an experience on each of the Ten Days. We have identified ten major themes of this sacred time. Each morning, an email will go out to the congregation. After briefly describing the theme of the day, it will provide three ways to reflect on the theme, following the Talmud's guidance. Relating to the theme, we will offer

- 1) Torah: a text to study with questions to reflect on
- 2) Avodah: a prayer to say or hear with personal reflections
- 3) G'milut Chasadim: an action people could do to bring the theme to life

We hope that exploring these suggestions will provide another meaningful and accessible way for people to incorporate the values of the High Holy Days into their lives.

Finally, we will have at least one in-person gathering. As we have done in past years, we will be meeting at Shovelshop Pond on the Governor Ames Estate for Tashlich, the beautiful introspective ritual of symbolically casting away our sins into a body of water. Additionally, as part of the theme of the day, we plan to offer a nightly gathering in which people can come together to share and reflect on what they learned, thought, or did about that value. As I write this message, it seems that those gatherings will also need to be online, but if there is a way for them to be in person, we will change.

As important as our building is, it is not what makes us a temple family. That is shown in how we connect and care for each other every day, whether online or in person, whether at High Holy Days or throughout the year. I am really looking forward to reaffirming our relationships with each other and our strength as the TCS community as we enter the new year 5781 together, even in these very different ways.



This year that's a challenging thing to do as our present-day losses have not ended. As a nation, as a world, we are still struggling.

The TCS community is a lifeline in these times. As I talk with members of our congregation and see posts on social media, I'm heartened by the strength and love I see in people's connections with each other.

We're having a special summer event to provide a source of connection for families with young children – a summer Tot Shabbat celebration on Friday, August 14th at 4:45 pm. If you are a friend, parent or grandparent of a Tot, or know someone who is, join us. Bring a friend, as our theme is to "attend with a friend" for a fun session of song, story and craft. I hope to see you there.

Rabbi Ken and I are also busy planning for a very special High Holy Days this year, and look forward to connecting with you at our regular weekly events, such as Shabbat services and Havdalah, Torah Study, Mah Nishmah, and Musical Morning Minyan. We may need to physically distance, but let's have social and spiritual connections!

The Board, at our last meeting, has authorized the creation of a Reopening Task Force which is comprised of an impressive group of congregants and staff with medical, public health, education and facility skills. The goal is to develop a comprehensive plan to reopen the synagogue and SULAM in a safe and thoughtful way. The Task Force has already met twice and, as part of the plan, will be sending out a questionnaire to members about your concerns, issues and priorities for reopening.

Lastly, I am very excited about this final initiative. As you are aware, when David Reichman and I sent out temple commitment letters in June, we acknowledged that the pandemic had financially impacted members of our community and we asked congregants, who could afford to, to contribute an additional amount beyond the normal commitment to help those challenged by this virus. I am delighted to inform you that four families have stepped up with a terrific challenge. Aaron and Liz Bornstein, Ross Mayer, Veronica and Howard Wiseman and Elaine and myself have offered to match, dollar for dollar, donations made to TCS up to a maximum of \$31,000. This generous challenge will allow us to meet a large portion of our fundraising goal and help those congregants impacted by the pandemic to remain members of our community. I am indebted to Aaron, Liz, Ross, Veronica and Howard for joining us in this campaign for TCS.

I come to TCS with experience in creative and innovative curriculum development, which will align well with our project-based learning educational philosophy. Examples of innovative programming I have successfully developed and implemented include a STEAM day (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) to celebrate Chanukah, a social justice themed Purim celebration, and Mitzvah Day projects. In addition, my management and business background will help to guide our school in budgeting as we navigate through these difficult times.

As you may have heard already, the Education Committee recommended, and the Temple Board approved, that we will start the school year in September with classes meeting online.

In keeping with the Jewish value of *pikuach nefesh*, saving life, we evaluated what protocols we would need to implement in order to start school in person and determined that opening in this way would not provide the ideal learning and community building experience for which we strive. Although we know that nothing can replace the benefits of the in person social and learning experience, please rest assured that we will be spending the remainder of the summer adapting our school curriculum so that we can provide rich and meaningful classes for your students and ensure that our teachers are prepared for the online environment. In so doing, we will be guided by best practices in Jewish education and by keeping the social, emotional, and physical well-being of our students at the core of our decisions.

The synagogue has formed a Task Force to evaluate what reopening looks like across all areas of the community - the office, meetings, programs, and services, in addition to the school, so that actions can be taken holistically and with everyone's best interest in mind. In conjunction with this effort, we will continue to explore whether there are ways for us to implement a hybrid model which would allow groups of students to be together. As these plans evolve, we will keep you informed both about the timing and specific safety procedures that we will be putting in place before such a program can begin.

If you have not yet had a chance to complete the registration process, please let me know if you have any questions or if there is anything that I can do to help. Please feel free to **email** me at any time to set up a time to talk. As a gentle reminder, the Education Director is now a part-time position at TCS. When not here, I am also the Cantor at Beth El Temple Center in Belmont, MA. I will be setting up some Zoom meetings shortly, so please be on the lookout for those dates, beginning in mid-August.

Thank you for your patience and support. Our families are the foundation of our strong community and we appreciate the trust and confidence that you place in all of us who have the privilege of educating your children. Even though I have only been part of the TCS family for a short time, I am grateful for the thoughtful and engaged way that everyone works together. Enjoy the rest of the summer!
